Hello everyone, My name is Steely Eyed Eagle Scout, and I am the investigative reporter for Detroit Area Council's Trail to Eagle camp newspaper, **The Aerie Chronicle**. The leadership from your troop asked me to report about Summertime. So here I go.....

Summertime, what can I say? It is a week long campout, held at beautiful Cole Canoe Base. I could go into the fantastic points, but we all know that, this time, I am giving some pointers and reminders.

All scouts and their parent(s) need to arrive at the church by 10 am Saturday July 22nd.

Medications

Scouts with medications need to have their medication in the original prescription bottle. The bottle should have the scouts name and dosage clearly visible. Please be sure to give all medications to the scout leaders at sign in. No scout should have prescription medicine in their possession while at camp. If you have any questions about this policy please send an email or give a call to Mr. Fox.

Important Items to Bring

Make sure all scouts have a hat and a water bottle. Scouts should carry their water bottle at all times. Being outside at camp, working hard at those merit badges can be hot thirsty work. All scouts will be asked to drink plenty of water to fight dehydration. Be sure to label all items that scouts bring to camp. This helps later when those lost and found items need to be returned. Scouts should bring a name stake to put outside of their tent, so we know who is in what tent.

Items Not Allowed at Camp

No electronic games, toys, MP3 players, cell phones, gameboys, PSP, or similar devices are allowed. The only battery powered devices should be a flashlight. Otherwise, if it has a battery leave it at home. Bikes are allowed at camp. But the troop will not allow Scouts to bring them, as the camp is small enough that walking will get the scouts where they need to go.

Letters from home are always nice. Mail call will be each morning. Be sure to send mail early in the week so it reaches the scout in time. The address is:

Please remember that you will be at camp for 1 week, and you will need clothes for everyday. That means underwear, shirts, shorts, and most importantly socks. Speaking of Socks, please make sure that you have enough, as you will be walking every where, and those are your most important tool, and they need to stay healthy.

Last Minute reminders

As a final reminder, the Troop is meeting with Troop 1111 on Friday July 21, at 7:00pm at FPC to pass out shirts, and any other final things. If you wish, you may bring your equipment to pack into the trailer. The more that is packed on Friday, the sooner we can get on the road Saturday morning, and to camp to get set up.

Scouts Learn About Heritage

Earlier this year, the Scouts in the Troop began working on the American Heritage Award. We have had 8 Scouts complete the requirements, and a couple that are almost finished, good job guys.

The United States Heritage Award was designed to give youth recognition for learning about the heritage of the United States of America, and showing patriotism. By earning this award, youth can cultivate an appreciation for the wonderful heritage of the United States of America.

A gold medal and a patch was awarded to all that successfully complete the award requirements. All requirements can be done with a class, unit, group, family, or individually, we did it as part of the Troop.

The United States Heritage Award Adult guide is available to assist adults in monitoring the requirements, in which I used.

To earn the United States Heritage Award a you must:

1. Tell when the Declaration of Independence was adopted.
2. Tell when the Constitution of the United States was signed.
3. Know the first two verses of the national anthem "The Star Spangled Banner." Tell who wrote it and when.
4. Know the Pledge of Allegiance. Explain what

it means.

5. The United States Flag:

a. Tell what the thirteen stripes represent. Please list all thirteen.

b. From 1795 to 1818 there was something different about the US Flag. Find out what it was and why it was changed.

c. Explain three proper ways of displaying the United States flag.

d. Tell how you show respect for the United States flag.

6. Do one of the following:

a. Find out what the parts of the flag are called. Draw a picture showing the following:

- Canton • Flag Staff • Fly
- Grommet • Field (or Ground) • Peak
- Fly End • Union • Hoist
- Truck • Finial • Halyard

7. Make a list of the 50 states of the United States of America.

8. Name the current President, Vice-President, and the Speaker of the House.

9. Name the two Senators for your state and the representative for your congressional district.

10. Render a service that benefits a neighborhood or community.
